THE CURATOR'S CORNER By Dave Kelly

First of all, I would like to say Thanks to Comrade Ray Robert for his donation of a laser type level that will assist me in positioning pictures etc. on bulkheads, (that's walls for the non sailor types).

Thanks also go to the Comrades that gave me their latest copy of the Legion magazine. I required about 6 copies as I am presently working on a project to frame the centerfold pullout of the Afghanistan casualties. This frame when completed will be placed in the Memorial Room.

Recently I was given a book on medals by the Comox Airforce Museum. Reading through it, I was surprised by the values on various medals. Some have increased quite substantially. As a result, I am now revaluing the many medals that are in our possession. One medal that is quite interesting is the Newfoundland Volunteer War Service medal that was donated by Comrade Maureen Felhauser on behalf of her father. While the Second World War was being fought, Newfoundland was still a separate British colony. Consequently Newfoundland servicemen did not qualify for the Canadian Volunteer Service medal, and this deficiency was not remedied until July 1981 when the Newfoundland provincial government instituted this medal. Those who had served with the Canadian forces, on the other hand, and already held the Canadian medal were not eligible for this award. The medal had to be applied for, and due to the timing of issue, and the numbers of those who since passed away before 1981 a very small number of these medals were awarded. This makes this medal fairly rare and is now valued at \$700 to \$800. You can view this medal etc. in the Memorial Room.

Speaking of values, when I originally took inventory of all our memorabilia etc., I valued all at \$35,000. With inflation, the rising costs of various items and donations since received, there is a value of close to \$40,000 here in our branch. That could be surprising to some. If you have any questions on any items etc., please see me and I will gladly respond.

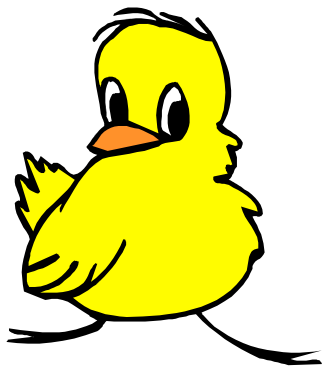

BRITAIN TO DOUBLE COMPENSATION FOR WAR WOUNDED

LONDON, Dec. 15 -- The British government is doubling the maximum cash payment it gives to severely wounded soldiers after criticism that amputees and other veterans of the Iraq and Afghan wars were not suitably compensated.

The Defense Ministry announced Monday that the current limit of 285,000 British pounds, or \$428,000 at current exchange rates, would be raised to 570,000 pounds, or \$855,000.

The increase will apply retroactively, with the government dividing \$15 million among 2,700 wounded soldiers who recently received lump-sum payments.

In the U.S. military, injured service members with a "disability rating" of 30 percent or less qualify for a lump-sum severance payment. An Army specialist with three years of service could receive as much as \$24,000 after a combat injury; a sergeant first class with 19 years of service would get as much as \$129,000, according to Samuel Rutherford, director of officer and enlisted personnel management at the Pentagon.

Rutherford said that troops with higher levels of disability do not receive a lump sum but are paid a monthly annuity that in some cases can be as much as their base pay at retirement, plus complete medical coverage.

The British government has been under pressure by military families and advocates to compensate the growing number of war wounded. Media campaigns have also drawn attention to the disparity between the large sums awarded in personal-injury cases involving civilians and the amounts paid to wounded soldiers.

"Justice for our Injured Heroes," blared Monday's front-page headline in the Daily Mail. The tabloid had noted that a civilian servicewoman who damaged her hand in the office had received \$725,000 in a civil case, while paratrooper Ben Parkinson, 24, who lost both of his legs, the use of one arm, his ability to speak, and much of his memory in a mine explosion in Afghanistan, had been offered \$228,000 under the military compensation

program.

Parkinson's payment will now double. The new Armed Forces Compensation Scheme will increase payments to soldiers from 10 percent to 100 percent depending on the severity of injury, the Defense Ministry said in a statement. The most injured soldiers, in addition to receiving a lump-sum payment, will also be entitled to lifetime monthly payments. That would mean that a severely wounded young soldier could receive more than \$1.5 million over the course of his life, the statement said.

Britain's undersecretary of state for defense, Kevan Jones, said the armed forces personnel "deserve the very best support," and that the new compensation package "will be a great boost to our injured personnel and their families."

Chris Simpkins, director general of the Royal British Legion, said the new program "is particularly good news coming just before Christmas."

HISTORY OF THE COMOX LEGION

One cannot think of the beginnings of the Comox Legion without recalling "Polly" Pollock. While many others contributed to building up a Legion Branch in Comox, Polly and to a slightly lesser extent, Kay his wife, were the driving force.

In 1938-39 several veterans would often gather in the Pollock kitchen and hold meetings. An application for a Legion charter was submitted in 1939. The charter is dated the 10th of September 1939, the day the Canadian Parliament declared war on Germany. The original charter hangs on the wall in the office to this day slightly damaged by fire.

Polly drew up the plans. Work on the hall started in 1940. There was only one paid worker, Bill Haggarty, all others were volunteer labourers. Many men worked hard and long without pay. Some well remembered names are: Fred Harris, George Laban, Dusty d'Esterre, Len Piket, George Cliffe, Frank Smith, Polly Pollock. Six sailors appeared each day from the Spit. They contributed a great deal to the building.

Financial matters were in the hands of J Bryant the first secretary-treasurer, who did an outstanding job through out the building phase and the war. A good deal of material was donated. The building was completed and the cornerstone laid in 1941. With the completion of the building, the

most important project was offering a place for servicemen to go during off duty hours. The canteen was a "dry" canteen, which meant no liquor of any kind was sold. Games were available, occasionally dances, but the principal attraction was the friendly atmosphere. The local ladies, many of whom were wives of Legionnaires operated the canteen. The canteen shut it's doors in 1946.

During all this time. Branch 160 had been wholeheartly and generously supported by the Ladies Auxiliary which was formed during the war. Not only did they support the Branch, but they also operated and managed the canteen. Kay Pollock was one of the chief organizers. Winnie and Ethel Cliffe both contributed a great deal. Furthermore. the LA did more than its share in helping with community projects.

In the early 1970's the branch needed more space. The President E A Robson drew up the plans. Work began in 1973 and was in progress when a fire broke out on August 3rd. Although damage was mainly confined to the upper floor and attic, water damage was extensive to the first floor and bar. The fire inspector estimated the property damage to be between eighty and ninety thousand dollars.

Again volunteer help was the "labour backbone" of the re-construction. Supervised by Rudy Snerch, Dave Dirksen, Eric Airton and Harry McCauley, a core of about 20 men appeared most days to work. In alphabetic order Ray Couzic, Jim Crotty, Jack Dingwall, Lew Forbes, Bruce Horochuck, Marvin Lee, Stan Leveridge, Doug Morgan, Frank Neff, Robbie Robson, Floyd Smith, George Tillotson, Duke Warren and Dave Webber. In addition. there was a host of others who showed up when they had free time. The support provided by the LA during this rather trying time was outstanding.

In February 1974 the official opening of the rebuilt Legion took place with Colonel Don McNichol, Base Commander CFB Comox, cutting the ribbon with a bayonet donated by Gordy Graham.

The members of Branch 160 can be justly proud of their building, built to a large extend by their own hands, financed by their confidence in the future. and managed by dedicated Presidents and their Executives over the years.

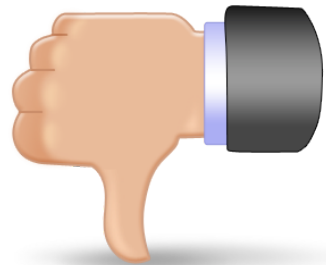
